Geary County 4-H Club Day

4-H Club Day will be held virtually for 2021. Live virtual Model Meetings and Gavel Games will be held on **February 20, 2021** via Zoom. All other presentations will be recorded and submitted electronically by the deadline of midnight on February 20th. Group dance, drama, and music presentations will not be allowed this year. Pre-entry forms are included with this newsletter and are due to the Extension Office or online at <https://tinyurl.com/4HDay2021> by **January 25, 2021** at 5:00pm. Event descriptions and further details are also included in this newsletter, so you can be sure to sign up for the category that fits you. 4-H Day is a great way to practice writing and presenting speeches, practice parliamentary procedure skills, and showcase your talents. Start planning now what you will do for 4-H Day!

Post-Secondary Education Scholarships

The Kansas 4-H program is changing the way 4-H scholarship applications are submitted for 2021. The applications will be submitted online and will be available at <https://www.kansas4-h.org/resources/4-h-library/awards-and-recognition/scholarships.html> by December 23rd. The original deadline published for Geary County was January 25th, but we are extending that deadline to **February 12th** due to the later date of the applications being available. The state 4-H website will provide a list of state-wide scholarships that are available. The County scholarships that are available this year are the Paul and Clara Gwin Scholarship, the Ralph Dietrich Scholarship, two Ray and Nellie Smith 4-H Scholarships, and the Flint Hills Preservation Coalition Scholarship. More information about how you can apply for county scholarships will be shared with high school seniors when more information about the state process is made available. Anyone else who would like to receive this information can contact the Extension Office.

4-H Enrollment

Online 4-H enrollment for the 2020-21 year should have been completed by now. If you have not taken care of this, please do so as soon as possible. This will ensure that you continue to receive newsletters and project information. Find more information about enrolling online at <http://www.geary.k-state.edu/4-h/forms.html>. Don't forget to use the code FCNYBG for payment.

Enrollment Deadline

The Geary County 4-H Foundation has set an enrollment deadline of January 1st in order to receive any funding from the foundation for the current 4-H year. Please make sure 4-H members are enrolled by January 1st in order to receive any event scholarship funds (including 4-H Camp) and/or post-secondary education scholarships made available by the foundation.

In-Person 4-H Meetings & Events

We received notice recently that K-State Research & Extension and Kansas 4-H have decided that the preferred method for all extension and 4-H meetings and events is by virtual means until we are no longer facing the COVID-19 challenge. If you would like to hold any in-person 4-H meeting or event, you will need to work with Ginger to complete a Face to Face Meeting necessity form at least 2 weeks prior to the meeting or event. This form will ask for a brief description of the proposed meeting or event, including educational objectives; justification of why the meeting or event needs to be held in person; and a detailed plan for COVID-19 mitigation during the meeting or event. K-State Research & Extension administration will review the forms and provide feedback. If you have questions about this or would like to complete a Face to Face Meeting necessity form, please contact the Extension Office. This process will be reviewed and potentially changed at the end of March.

New Record Book Forms

New record book forms are here! Once you have enrolled, you will receive a copy of the appropriate record form(s) with your enrollment materials. You are encouraged to use the form-fillable versions that are available on the Kansas 4-H website at <https://www.kansas4-h.org/resources/4-h-library/awards-and-recognition/ProjectRecognition.html>. If you need additional hard copies of the form, please contact the Extension Office. The next Project Meeting Evening will be held virtually on January 4th and will cover these new record forms. To go along with the new record forms, a new Outstanding Record Book Score Sheet is attached to this newsletter.

The current plan is a community conversation, including deliberating and finding common ground on Sunday afternoon (tentatively 1:00 to 5:30pm). Participation
Requirement for 2021**

4-H members will be required to attend at least 4 regular monthly meetings of the 4-H club in which they are enrolled between October 1 and June 30 to participate in the project/livestock auction held at the end of the fair in 2021. Official record of meetings attended will be the club secretary's book. This requirement does not limit fair participation, only participation in the auction. Plan ahead now to make sure youth meet the requirement if they want to participate in the auction.

Geary County 4-H Day 2021 Entry Materials

Geary County 4-H Day will be held virtually for 2021. Live virtual Model Meetings and Gavel Games will be held on February 20th via Zoom. All other presentations will be recorded and submitted electronically by the deadline of February 20th at midnight. All who pre-enter will be given further details on submitting videos. Group dance, drama, and music presentations will not be allowed this year. Now is the time to start thinking about which events you would like to participate in for 4-H Day. The following are some descriptions of the events and some hints that will help you prepare. Also included is the entry form which is due to the Extension Office by 5pm on **January 25, 2021**. Entry forms can also be submitted online at <https://tinyurl.com/4HDay2021>. If your entry form is not turned in by the deadline, you will not be included on the schedule. Remember that juniors are 7 to 12 years old as of January 1, 2021 and seniors are 13 and over as of January 1, 2021.

All activities will be judged and placed in a blue, red, or white ribbon category with a purple ribbon awarded to those most deserving at the end of judging, except Cloverbud 4-H entries and the Show and Tell category. All Cloverbud 4-Her's and those who participate in Show and Tell will receive a participation ribbon for their talks or talent numbers. (Although participation will not be competition judged, judges' comments will be given.)

PowerPoint can only be used for Project Talks and Demonstrations.

4-H Day is a good time to develop self-confidence and poise. It's an opportunity to practice presentation skills and share your 4-H experiences and talents. I hope every one of you will find something that interests you and will get involved in 4-H Day!

Parliamentary Procedure Contests

Gavel Games - A parliamentary procedure demonstration

- * Junior and Senior Divisions
- * 4 members per team plus an at-large member (optional)
- * 20 minute maximum time limit
- * Senior team members will draw for the office of president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, member (if a 5 person team); Junior team members can pre-assign officer positions
- * Each team will be required to do a certain number of specific motions
- * One junior and one senior team may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Model Meetings - Shows example of a complete business meeting

- ✓ 35 minute maximum time limit (time will not include roll call)
- ✓ Meeting agenda is required for judge (judge will deduct one ribbon placing if the agenda is not made available) (further details on submitting agendas will be shared with clubs)
- ✓ Recreation may be at any time during the meeting (recreation is not allowed at Regional 4-H Day)
- ✓ Leaders should participate in the meeting as they normally do. Advice and counsel will be in order and may include announcements and reports.
- ✓ Each club will draw one parliamentary procedure problem to incorporate into their model meeting. The problems you will draw from are:
 - Division of the house
 - Division of the question
 - Lay a motion on the table
 - Take a motion from the table
 - Previous question
- ✓ One entry may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Public Speaking

Project Talk - A speech telling about a project in which you are currently enrolled. This speech may include your experiences and/or information relating to the project as well as promotion of the project. The purpose is to inform.

- ★ For 4-H members 7 to 12 years old
- ★ Time recommended: 3 to 4 minutes, 7 minutes maximum
- ★ Topics may be on a 4-H project or an aspect of a project a 4-H member is currently enrolled in
- ★ Visuals are encouraged, but are not required
- ★ PowerPoint is allowed in this category
- ★ A project talk includes three parts:
 - Introduction* - The opening statement and attention-getter
 - Body* - The main part of the talk. Tell the main idea of your talk, then explain or illustrate important facts in developing the main idea.
 - Conclusion/Summary* - Repeat a few of the major points of your talk.
- ★ Two entries may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Demonstrations and Illustrated Talks - A demonstration is defined as a “show-how” process involving doing or making something while giving an explanation. The demonstrator uses actual items, supplies, equipment, people, or animals while going through a process. There should be a finished product to show. Sometimes a finished product is not possible, but it does enhance a demonstration, is highly suggested, and may influence the ribbon placing. An illustrated talk is defined as a “tell-how” process where the presenter uses visuals such as posters, charts, models, graphs, etc. to aid in emphasizing a point or to add interest while telling how to do something. Visuals **are** required in an illustrated talk.

- Junior Division for 4-H members 7 to 12 years old; Time recommended: 4 to 7 minutes, 10 minutes maximum
- Senior Division for 4-H members 13 years and older; Time recommended 5 to 10 minutes, 15 minutes maximum
- A summary that reviews important points is required as part of the speech
- Should begin with a catchy introduction
- Either individual or team presentations
- The topic may be related to a project in which the 4-Her is currently enrolled
- The endorsement of brand names is discouraged
- All necessary equipment is provided by the 4-Her
- PowerPoint is allowed for both age divisions in this category
- Two entries from each age division may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Some hints for Demonstrations:

- ❖ Cover the demonstration table with a tablecloth or paper
- ❖ Move ingredients to one side of the table as you demonstrate
- ❖ 4-Her should set up and clean up their own demonstration
- ❖ Show your finished project
- ❖ Clean up your table before you show the finished project

Public Speaking

- ◆ Junior Division for 4-Hers 11 and 12 years old; Time recommended: 5 to 7 minutes, 10 minutes maximum
- ◆ Senior Division for 4-Hers 13 years and older; Time recommended: 5 to 7 minutes, 15 minutes maximum
- ◆ Topic unlimited
- ◆ Visuals are optional, they should enhance the talk, not distract. No posters or PowerPoint presentations allowed.
- ◆ Outline is required for judge (judge will deduct one ribbon placing if outline is not available) (further details on submitting outlines will be shared with participants)
- ◆ If notes are used, note cards are recommended instead of paper
- ◆ Junior Division not eligible to advance to Regional 4-H Day
- ◆ Two Senior Division entries may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Sharing

- ☺ For Cloverbud 4-H members (must be enrolled)
- ☺ Time recommended: 2 to 3 minutes
- ☺ Props or posters optional
- ☺ Topic may be any 4-H related project or item
- ☺ Each 4-Her entering will receive a participation ribbon
- ☺ Not eligible to advance to Regional 4-H Day

Show and Tell

- ⚙ For any first year member who is not giving another talk
- ⚙ Time recommended: 2 to 3 minutes
- ⚙ Props or posters optional
- ⚙ Topic may be any 4-H related project or item
- ⚙ Each 4-Her entering will receive a participation ribbon
- ⚙ Not eligible to advance to Regional 4-H Day

Music

General Hints:

- ✿ If a number is short, play it through twice
- ✿ Recorded music for accompaniment is allowed and encouraged in all music divisions, **if** you have original copies of the music on the recording

Vocal Solo - Junior and Senior

- ✿ Participant will sing one number
- ✿ Participants will be given further information about providing music for the judge
- ✿ Accompanist need not be a 4-Her
- ✿ Selection should be memorized or judge will deduct one ribbon placing
- ✿ One junior entry and one senior entry may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Instrumental Solo - Junior and Senior

- ✍ Participant will play one number
- ✍ Participants will be given further information about providing music for the judge
- ✍ Memorization of number is NOT required
- ✍ Accompanist is not required to be a 4-Her
- ✍ One junior entry and one senior entry may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Dance

- »»> Each category has a 5 minute time limit
- »»> One junior entry and one senior entry may be selected for Regional 4-H Day
- »»> Introduction (including name, 4-H club, and description of performance) is important
- »»> Recorded music is encouraged for all categories
- »»> Types of dance: country (swing or line dance), folk (circle dance, polka, schottische, waltz), choreographed (as seen at half-time shows), or other (tap dance, jazz, break/street dance, interpretive, or acrobatic dance)

Junior Solo Dance

Senior Solo Dance

Drama

Reading - Junior and Senior

- ⊗ Poetry interpretation or prose interpretation
- ⊗ Dramatic, interpretive, humorous, or other type of reading
- ⊗ Individual presentation only
- ⊗ 10 minute maximum time limit
- ⊗ Have an attention-getting introduction that includes name of participant, 4-H club, title and author, which also sets the scene for your piece
- ⊗ No props beyond a folder or book may be used
- ⊗ No extra points will be awarded for memorized work
- ⊗ One junior and one senior may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Solo Acting - Junior and Senior

- Must be memorized or judge will deduct one ribbon placing
- The material is generally something that was published as a script, but can be done from a story. The pieces may be single or multiple characters (one person performs all the parts).
- Individual presentation only
- 10 minute maximum time limit
- 4-Her may move around and props may be used
- Include an attention-getting introduction that includes name of participant, 4-H club, title and author, which also sets the scene for your piece
- One junior and one senior may be selected for Regional 4-H Day

Other Talent - Junior and Senior

- ◆ Miscellaneous grouping may include talent such as novelty numbers, stunts, pantomime, puppets, marionettes, ventriloquist acts, baton routines, gymnastics routines, or other types of talent
- ◆ Individual presentations only
- ◆ 10 minute maximum time limit
- ◆ Introduction is important (name, club, description of performance) and is not included in time allowed
- ◆ One junior entry and one senior entry may be selected for Regional 4-H Day
