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Wildlife Plantings

This is Gardening with Chuck. I'm Chuck Otte, Geary County Extension Agent. I get a lot of questions from homeowners who want to be able to attract more birds to their bird feeders. They start talking to me about the bird feeders they have and the feed they are putting in them. I listen and then ask what their landscaping looks like. Yes, having birdfeeders will help attract birds, but to really make the yard bird friendly you have to have landscaping so that the birds have access and escape routes where they feel safe. Birds like to work their way down to feeders so that they can survey the area and see if there are hawks or cats. The Kansas Forest Service sells seedling trees and shrubs and have some nice pollinator bundles that while aimed at insects will also provide some food and cover for many bird species. You get 25 or 30 plants. You can order online for spring delivery. I'm Chuck Otte and this has been Gardening with Chuck.

Plan Before You Plant

Too many gardeners go through the winter all cooped up like a caged animal. By the time plants start showing up in greenhouses they become like a kid with a five dollar bill in a candy shop; zero restraint. Which is just the opposite of how it should be. Good landscaping and gardening begins with making a plan showing how much space you have, then an inventory of how much space you have, and then you make a list of where something needs to be planted. This allows you to be far more deliberate about picking the right plant for the right place instead of trying to figure out where you are going to put all those plants you just bought.
